JACOB BIRMINGHAM WRITER/DIRECTOR, THE LEGEND OF BILL

JACOB BIRMINGHAM is a director and animator best known for *The Legend of Bill*, which won Best Sound Design and Best Original Score at Lipscomb University's **5-Minute Film Festival**. Originally from Texas, he moved to Nashville to study animation under former Disney and Big Idea directors. With a background in motion graphics and a BFA in Film & Media Arts from the University of Oklahoma, Jacob blends comedy and drama in his storytelling. He is currently developing *The Legend of Bill* into an animated TV series.



he film's poster created by student Karly Falanga IN 2023, A DEDICATED TEAM OF OVER 40 LIPSCOMB UNIVERSITY animation students crafted *The Legend of Bill*, a five-minute animated short that has since garnered international acclaim. The film narrates the tale of Bill, a duck who defies odds to compete in a Texas desert off-road race. Its unique visual style seamlessly blends 3D animation, ideal for depicting the depth and realism of racing vehicles, with 2D hand-drawn techniques that capture expressive character emotions.

Under the direction of MFA student **Jacob Birmingham**, the project began in an Animation Production course and evolved into an extracurricular endeavor. The core team of 13 graduate and undergraduate students, supported by faculty with industry experience, collaborated intensively over 15 weeks to bring the story to life. Their efforts were complemented by original music from Kaleb Clarke and a film poster designed by senior Karly Falanga.

Since its completion, "The Legend of Bill" has been selected, nominated, or awarded at more than 15 international film festivals. Notably, it won the Audience Choice Award at the **Nashville Film Festival** and and faculty.

secured first prize in the Student Mixed Media/Combo category at the Los Angeles Animated Film Fest. The film also received Best Student Film at the Grand Motoring Film Festival in South Carolina and Best Animation Film at the French Duck Film Festival in Paris.

In early 2025, the film screened at the KidFilm Family Festival in Dallas and is slated to be showcased at Ireland's Animation Dingle Festival, a qualifying event for the Student Academy Awards®, in March. Additionally, the film is an official selection at Vanderbilt University's inaugural Point of VU student film festival on February 15.

Reflecting on the journey, Birmingham stated, "Animation is a team sport, and it takes a crew to cross the finish line on a project this ambitious." The success of the film stands as a testament to the talent, dedication, and collaborative spirit of Lipscomb's animation students and faculty.


The Story

Of all disabilities, autism ranks the lowest for employment. Nearly eighty percent of people with autism, worldwide, are unemployed or underemployed. Lost Potential will explore societal attitudes and misconceptions that hinder the inclusion of people with autism in the workforce.

As a person with autism, I know the struggle with finding proper employment. Autism affects nearly eighty million people across the globe and companies should embrace the value, strength, and talent of people on the spectrum.

This feature-length documentary will take the viewer through my personal story of struggle and discovery with autism, and its hindrances on employment. I will dive into the hard truth of what someone with autism faces living in a world designed for a different mind. But this is not just my story, I will talk with other people with autism as well as experts to show the harsh reality that so many face while encouraging those with autism to leverage their "superpowers".


